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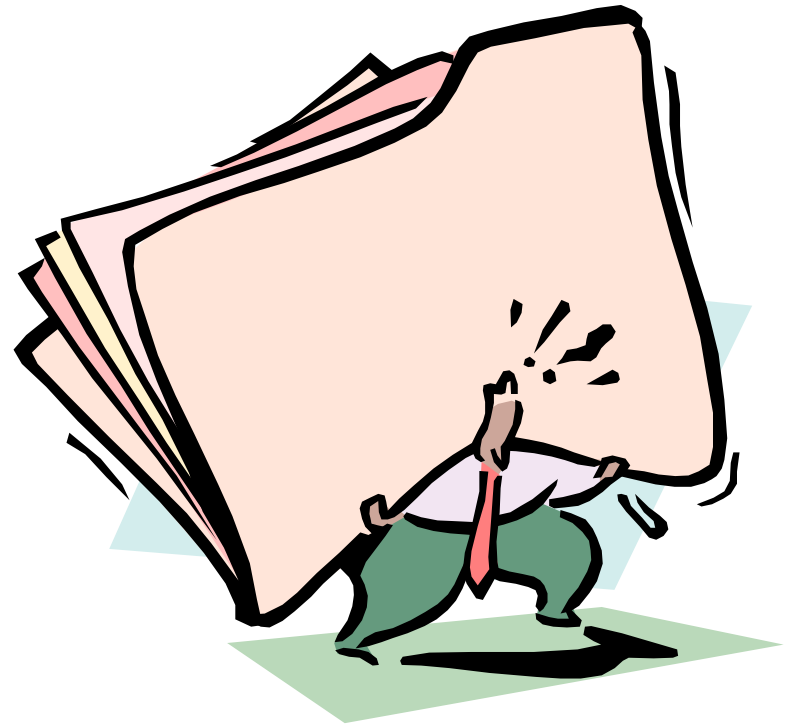

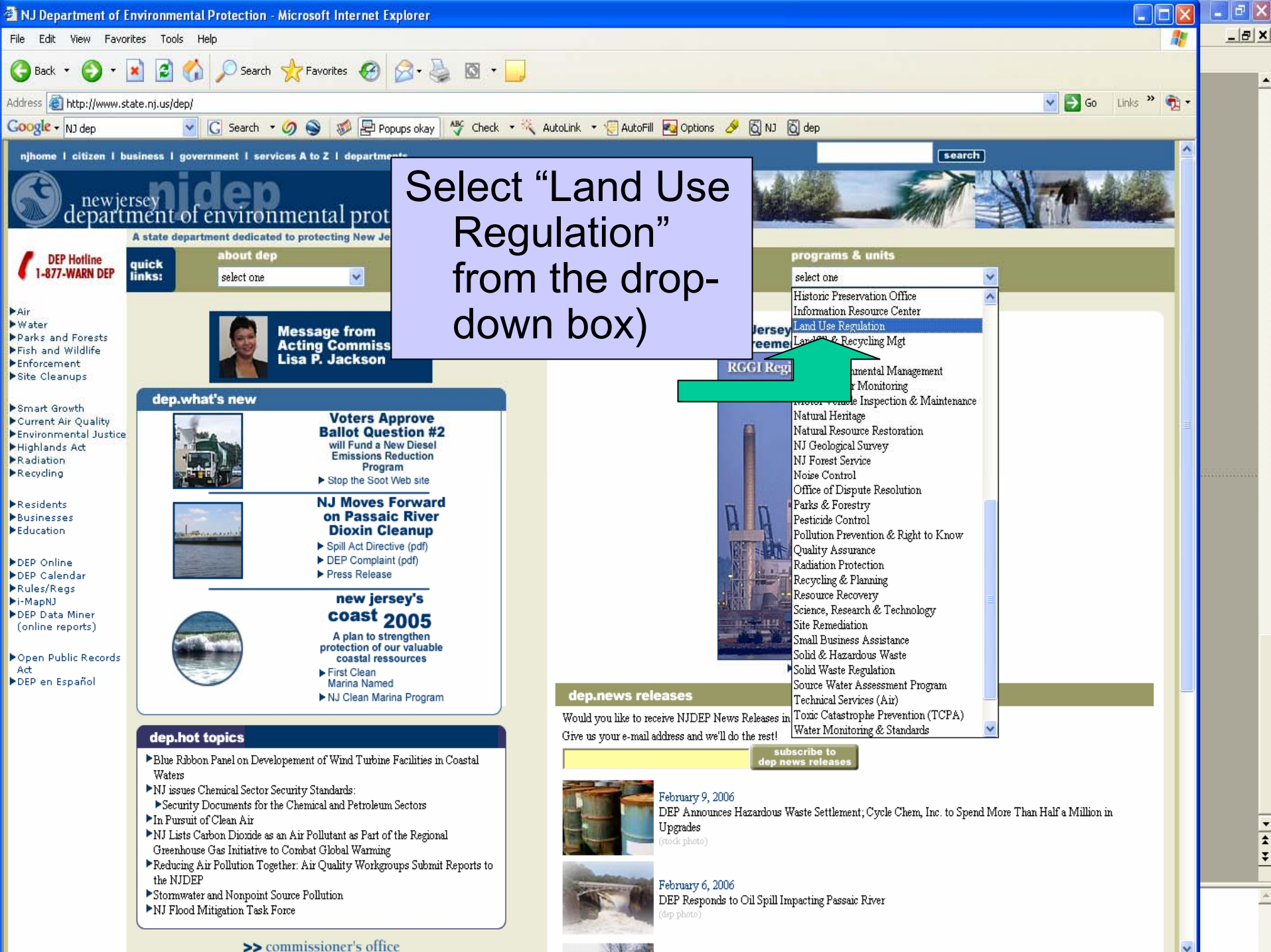

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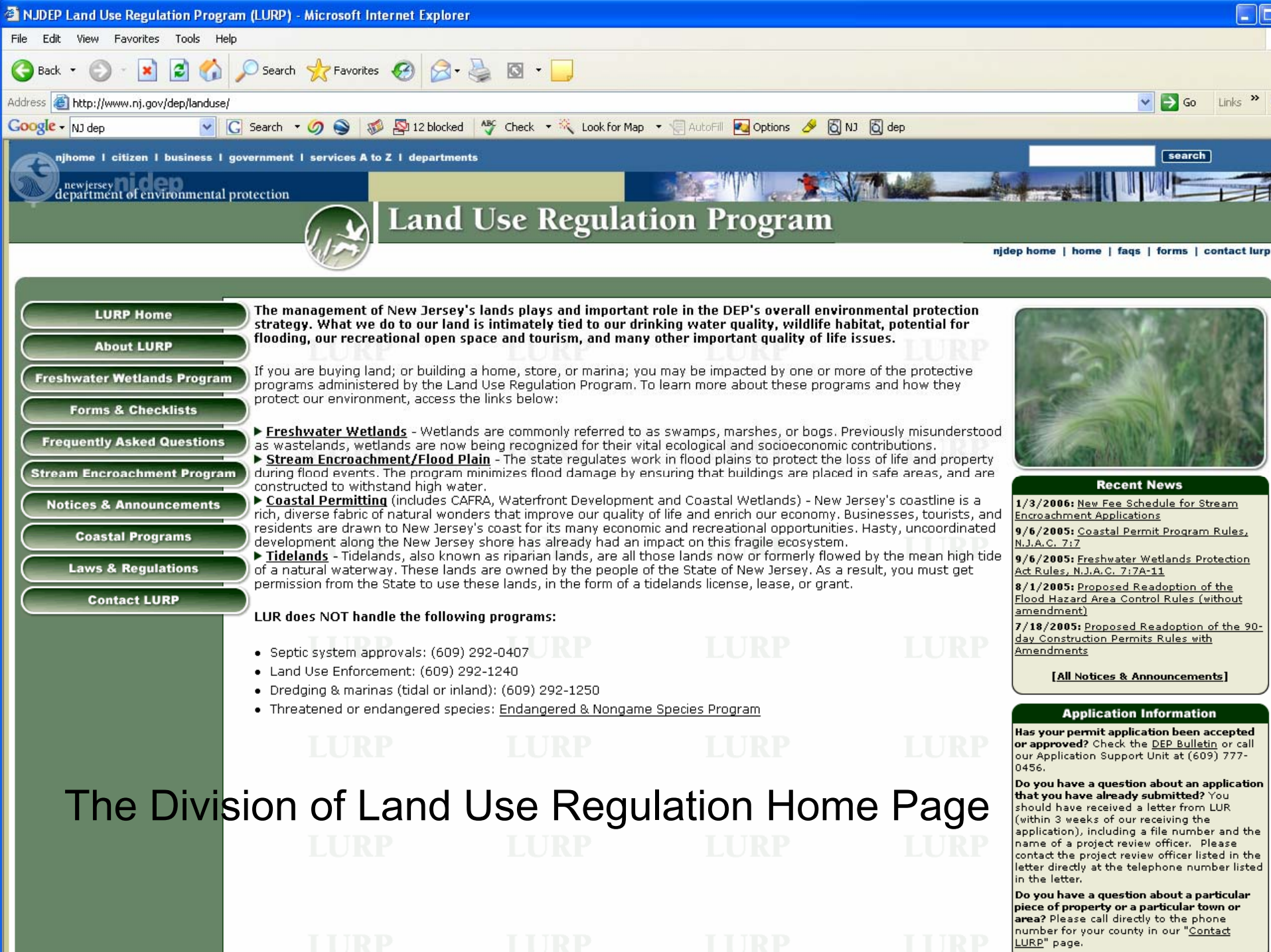


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# Land Use Regulation Program

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The management of New Jersey's lands plays an important role in the DEP's overall environmental protection strategy. What we do to our land is intimately tied to our drinking water quality, wildlife habitat, potential for flooding, our recreational open space and tourism, and many other important quality of life issues.

If you are buying land; or building a home, store, or marina; you may be impacted by one or more of the protective programs administered by the Land Use Regulation Program. To learn more about these programs and how they protect our environment, access the links below:

- ▶ **Freshwater Wetlands** - Wetlands are commonly referred to as swamps, marshes, or bogs. Previously misunderstood as wastelands, wetlands are now being recognized for their vital ecological and socioeconomic contributions.
- ▶ **Stream Encroachment/Flood Plain** - The state regulates work in flood plains to protect the loss of life and property during flood events. The program minimizes flood damage by ensuring that buildings are placed in safe areas, and are constructed to withstand high water.
- ▶ **Coastal Permitting** (includes CAFRA, Waterfront Development and Coastal Wetlands) - New Jersey's coastline is a rich, diverse fabric of natural wonders that improve our quality of life and enrich our economy. Businesses, tourists, and residents are drawn to New Jersey's coast for its many economic and recreational opportunities. Hasty, uncoordinated development along the New Jersey shore has already had an impact on this fragile ecosystem.
- ▶ **Tidelands** - Tidelands, also known as riparian lands, are all those lands now or formerly flowed by the mean high tide of a natural waterway. These lands are owned by the people of the State of New Jersey. As a result, you must get permission from the State to use these lands, in the form of a tidelands license, lease, or grant.

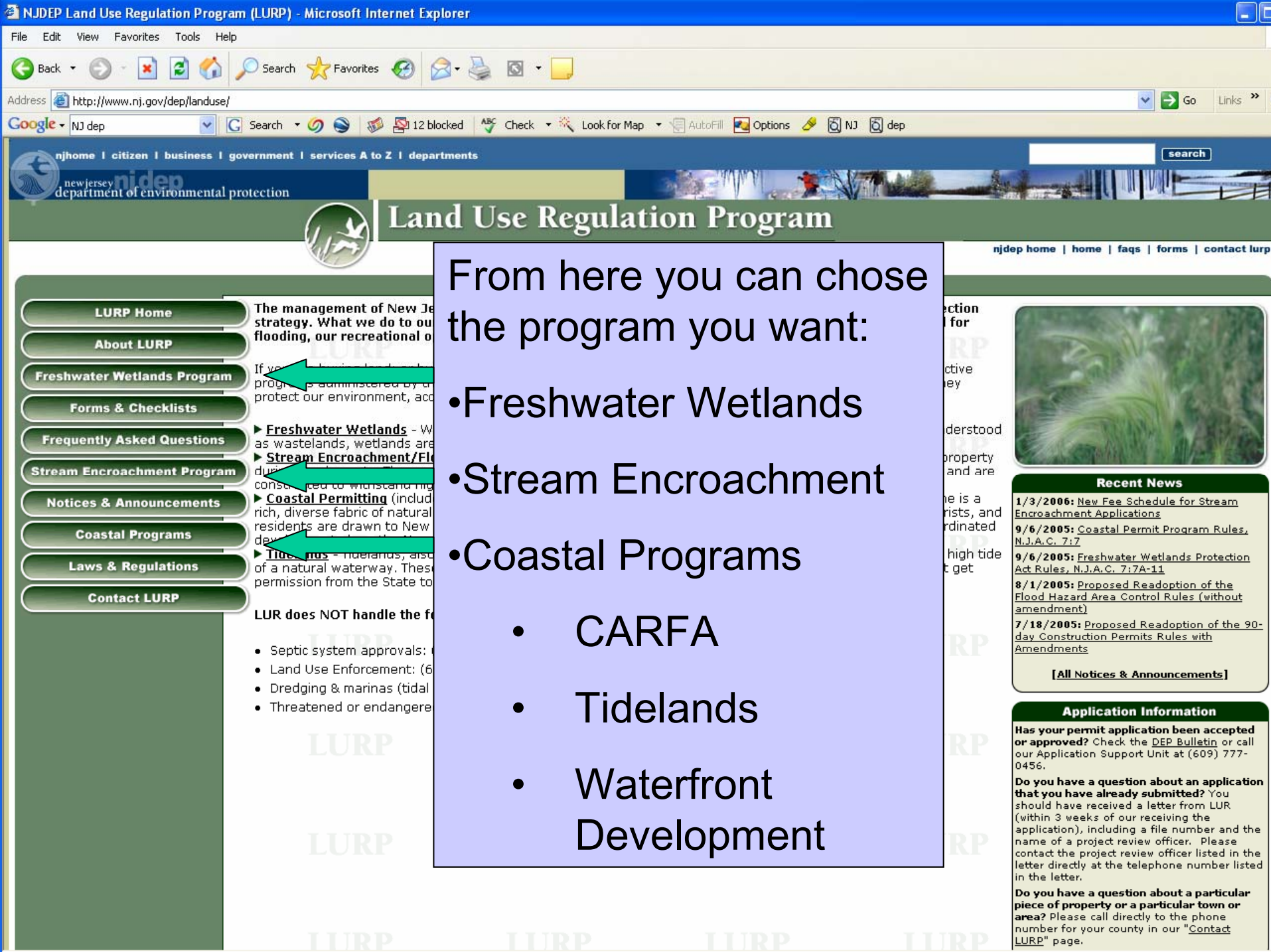

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The management of New Jersey's coastal resources is a top priority. What we do to our coastal resources affects our recreational opportunities, our economy, and our environment.

If you are interested in learning more about the programs administered by the Department of Environmental Protection to protect our environment, access the following information:

- ▶ **Freshwater Wetlands** - Wetlands are areas that are saturated with water as wastelands, wetlands are areas that are saturated with water.
- ▶ **Stream Encroachment/Fluvial Alteration** - Stream encroachment is the disturbance of a stream channel during construction or other activities.
- ▶ **Coastal Permitting** (including dredging, fill, and other activities) - Coastal permitting is the process of reviewing and approving or denying applications for activities that affect the coastal zone.
- ▶ **Tidelands** - Tidelands, also known as tidal wetlands, are areas of a natural waterway that are periodically flooded by high tide.

**LUR's Laws:** LUR is authorized to act by the State Public Policies, procedures, permitting and other activities of the Stream Encroachment Program.

**LUR's Regulations:** LUR implements the laws through rules found in the New Jersey Administrative Code (N.J.A.C.). These rules spell out in detail how LUR administers its permit programs. 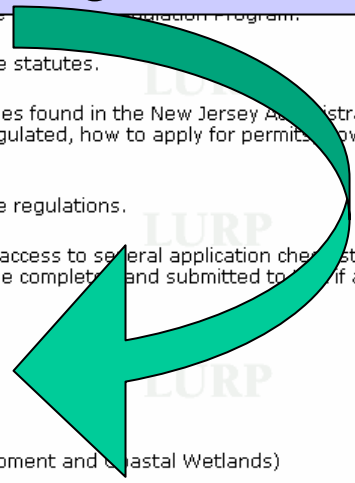

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### BEFORE YOU BUY - BEFORE YOU BUILD

Are you considering buying undeveloped land? Building a home, a retail center, or marina? How about putting in a driveway or an addition to your house? In every case, the presence of wetlands may affect where and whether you buy, build, or develop. In New Jersey and throughout the United States, wetlands are protected on public and private property.

New Jersey protects wetlands under the New Jersey Freshwater Wetlands Protection Act, N.J.S.A. 13:9B. This law also protects transition areas or "buffers" around freshwater wetlands. New Jersey also protects coastal wetlands under a different law. See the pamphlet entitled Guide to New Jersey's Coastal Permitting Program if you are in a coastal area and think you may have coastal wetlands on your property.

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### WHAT ARE WETLANDS?

Wetlands are commonly referred to as swamps, marshes, or bogs. However, many wetlands in New Jersey are forested and do not fit the classic picture of a swamp or marsh. Previously misunderstood as wastelands, wetlands are now being recognized for their vital ecological and socioeconomic contributions.

### BEFORE YOU BUY - BEFORE YOU BUILD

Are you thinking of buying property by a river for your new office building, store or shopping center? Or maybe you'd like to build a little cottage by a pond, lake or stream? Maybe you want to expand your existing building or home and a small stream is in the way, or you need to cross a stream with your new driveway

In all these cases you are most likely in a flood plain and you probably need a Stream Encroachment Permit before you build. In New Jersey and throughout the country, building in areas subject to flooding is regulated to protect lives, property, and the environment.

New Jersey regulates construction in the flood plain under the Flood Hazard Area Control Act, N.I.S.A. 58:16A-50 et seq., and its implementing rules at N.J.A.C. 7:13.

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### WHAT IS THE FLOOD PLAIN?

The flood plain is the area adjacent to a stream, lake or pond, which is covered by floodwater when it rains. This area can shrink or expand depending on how much it rains. In general, the regulated flood plain is the area that would be covered by water during the "100 year storm" - a storm which has a 1 in 100 chance of occurring in any one year period.

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### WHY REGULATE WORK IN A FLOOD PLAIN?

The state regulates work in flood plains for two reasons. First, such regulation protects the person who is building from loss of life and property in case of a flood. Flooding causes an estimated \$3 billion of damage in the United States every year. State regulations minimize the damage by ensuring that buildings are placed in safe areas, and are constructed to withstand high water.

The second reason to regulate building in flood plains is to protect other properties along the stream or pond from flood damage. When you build on a flood plain and the waters begin to rise, the buildings on your property displace water, thus increasing the height of the rising waters, and making the flooding worse.

#### BEFORE YOU BUY - BEFORE YOU BUILD

Are you considering buying property near tidal water? Building an oceanfront home, a retail center, or marina? Do you want to put in a bulkhead or a dock? Or maybe an addition to an existing house in a coastal town? In each of these cases, New Jersey's coastal permit program may affect where and whether you buy, build, or add on. In New Jersey and throughout the United States, coastal property is regulated to protect public safety and the environment.

New Jersey protects coastal waters and the land adjacent to them under a variety of laws, including the Waterfront Development Law (N.J.S.A. 12:5-3), the Coastal Area Facility Review Act (N.J.S.A. 13:19), and the Wetlands Act of 1970 (N.J.S.A. 13:9A). The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) applies the New Jersey Coastal Permit Program Rules, N.J.A.C. 7:7, and the Coastal Zone Management Rules, N.J.A.C. 7:7E, to determine what may or may not be built under these three laws.

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#### WHY DOES THE STATE REGULATE COASTAL LAND?

New Jersey's coastline is a rich and diverse fabric of natural wonders and economic engines that improve our quality of life and enrich our economy. Businesses, tourists, and residents are drawn to New Jersey's coast for its many economic and recreational opportunities. Coastal industries contribute enormously to New Jersey's economy. Coastal land provides crucial habitat for a wealth of wildlife, including migrating birds, commercially valuable fish and shellfish, and sporting and recreational species.

Yet our coastline is under threat from human activities. Hasty, uncoordinated development along the New Jersey shore has already had an impact on this fragile ecosystem. Regulation is necessary to prevent pollution, destruction of vital wildlife habitat, increases in rainwater runoff, and destruction of the natural beauty that attracts visitors. Regulation of coastal activities is also necessary in some cases to prevent loss of life and property from coastal storms, erosion, and flooding.

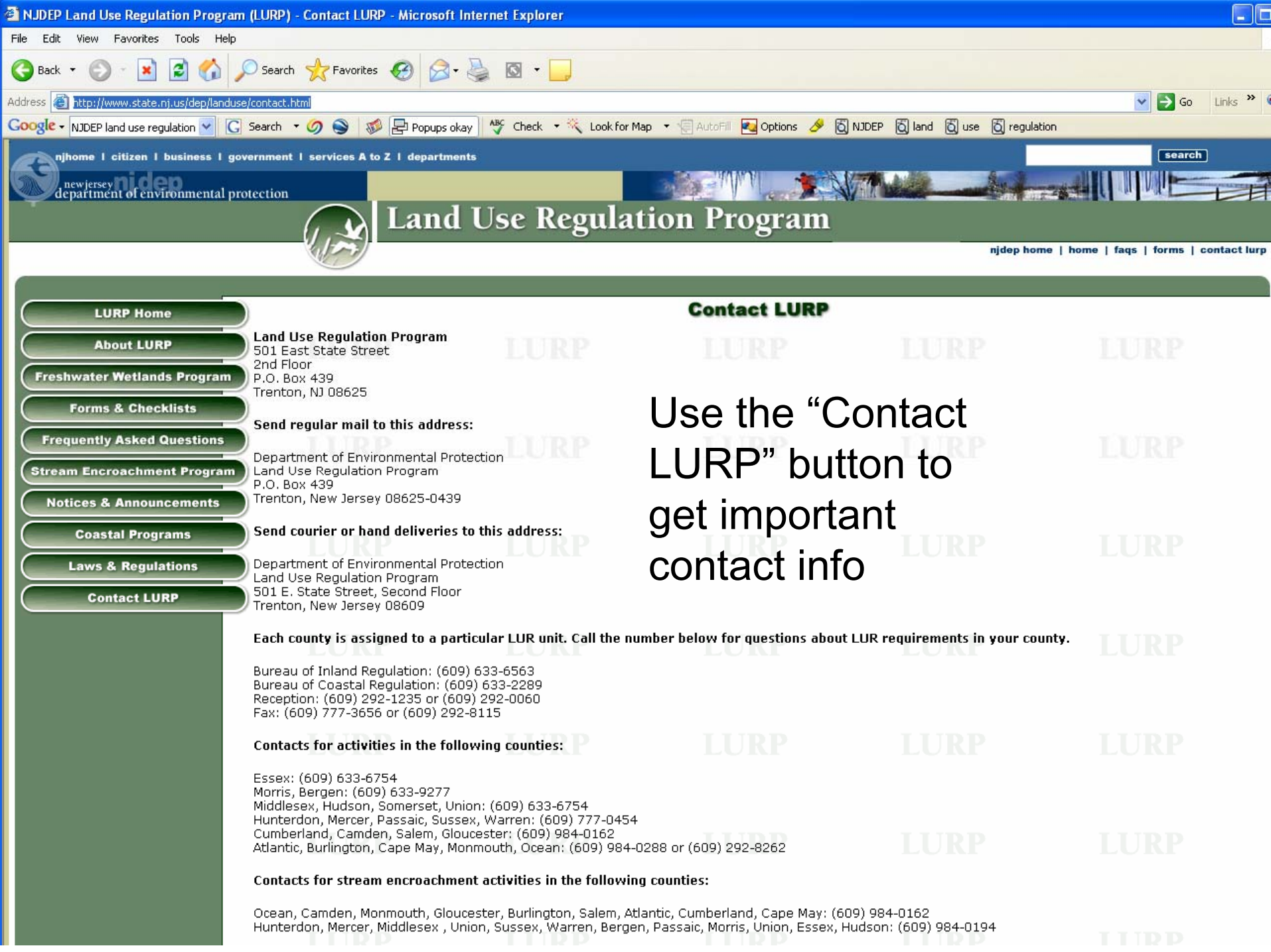

### How do I tell if my land has features regulated by the Land Use Regulation Program?

If your property is located near a river, stream, or lake, or has an area that often has standing water, a low spot that holds water for several days after a heavy rain, a shallow pond near the ground surface, a stream or pond with gentle banks (there is often a fringe of wetlands along the banks), you may have freshwater wetlands. You should find out if you need DEP approval before you build.

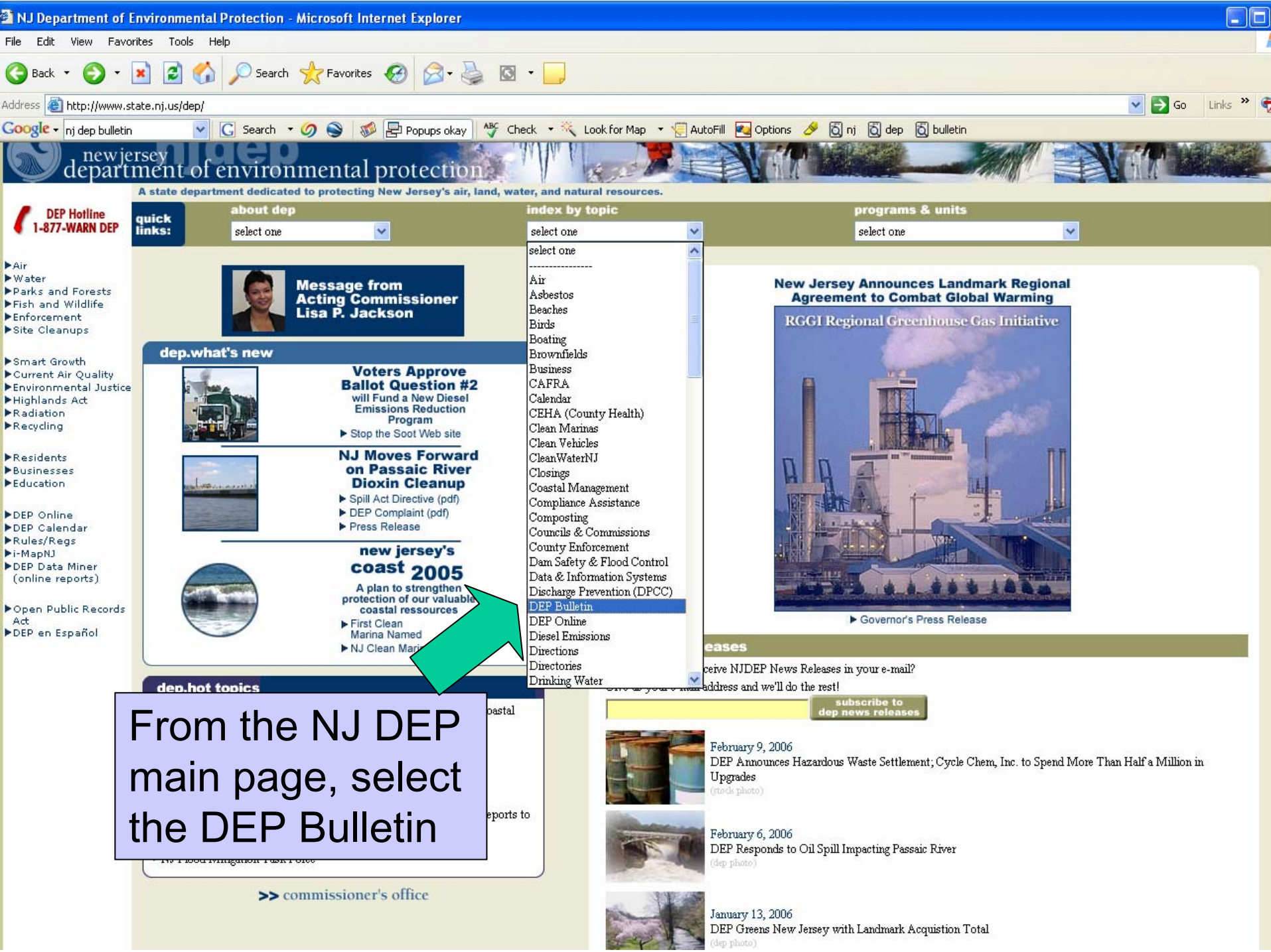
If your property is located near a stream, river, pond or lake on or near your property, especially one with gently sloping banks, you may have a floodplain and should make sure you get DEP approval before you work on the property.

If your property is located adjacent to coastal waters in the southern part of the State, you are probably in the CAFRA zone and probably need a permit.

If you are planning to build something in a tidal water (for example, a dock), or within 100 to 500 feet of tidal water, you are probably subject to the Waterfront Development Act.

If your property contains a tidally flowed wetlands (sometimes called a salt marsh), you are probably subject to the Coastal Wetlands Act.





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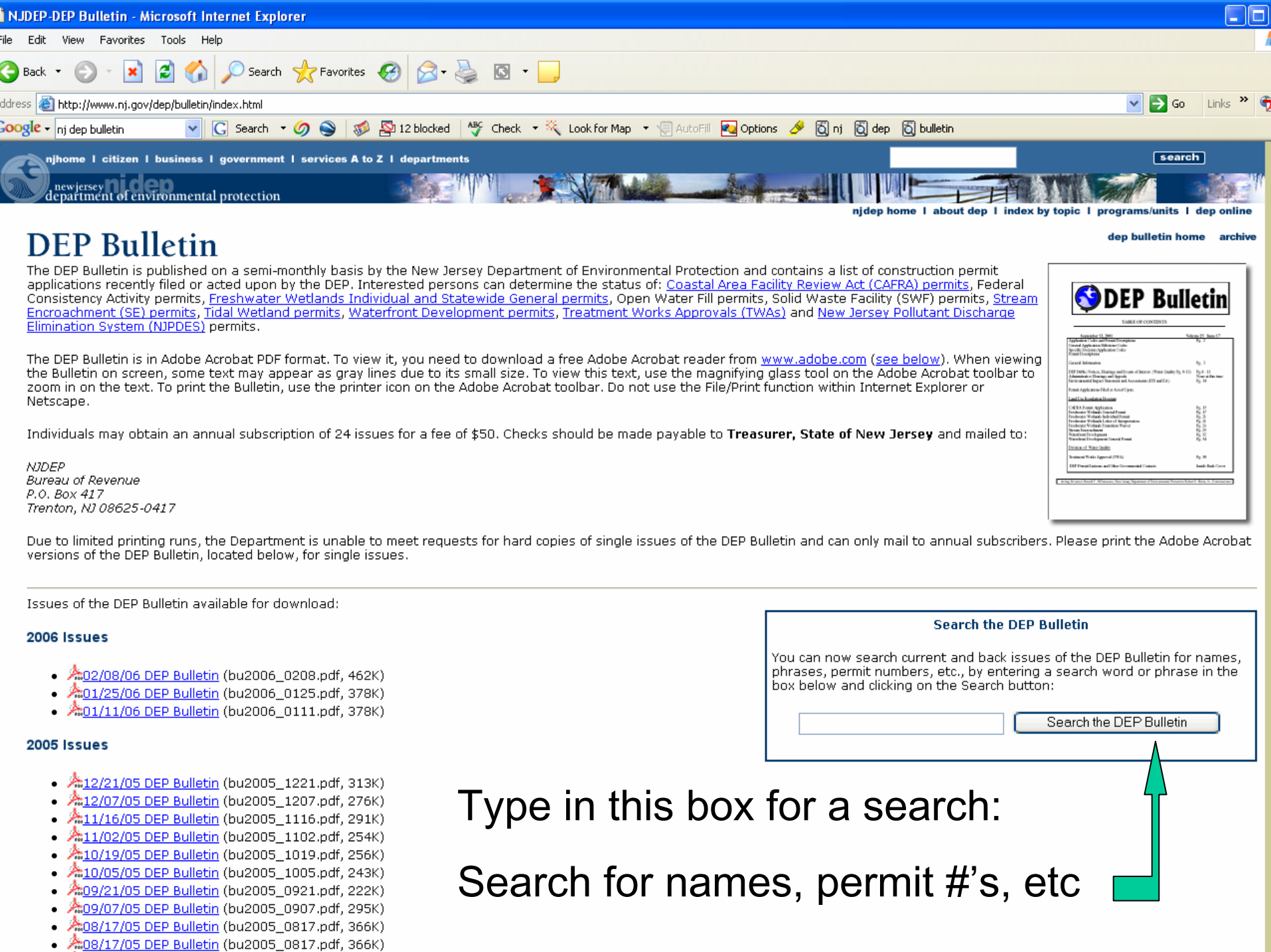
